



Environment Protection Act 2017



General Environmental Duty (GED)

"A person who is engaging in an activity that may give rise to risks of harm to human health or the environment from pollution or waste must minimise those risks, so far as <u>reasonably practicable</u>."

- Modelled on the OHS Act (an approach adopted in Victoria since 1985)
- Minimise means to eliminate the risks (as far as reasonably practicable) and if not, reduce the risks.
- Criminal liability for a person conducting a business
- Serious criminal offence maximum of approximately **\$1.6 million** for a company.




A duties framework


- General environmental duty (preventative duty)
- Duty to restore
- Duty to notify of event
- Duty to manage contamination
- Duty to notify of contamination
- Duty to manage industrial waste disposal
- Duties for priority waste












Reasonably practicable

To determine what is *reasonably practicable* consider:

- Likelihood;
- The degree of harm;
- What a person ought to know about the risks; and
- available controls:
 - The availability and suitability of ways to eliminate or reduce those risks
 - o Costs of eliminating or reducing those risks.

Supported by industry guidance materials to help establish "state of knowledge"



How are we supporting businesses?

2022 - Greenhouse gas emission guidelines

- Expected publication in August 2022.
- Guidelines support GED compliance; not new laws
- Forms part of the state of knowledge
- Outlines a risk management approach
- The guideline will support businesses in undertaking these steps

Waste – Reducing Regulatory Barriers

- Use of Waste to Energy residuals such as bottom ash
 - Supporting regulatory pathways for the safe use of bottom ash from the thermal destruction of waste
- Use of digestates from anaerobic digestors
 - Identifying regulatory pathways and specifications for the use of beneficial organic material in digestates
- Streamlining collection of small amounts of ULABs
 - Supporting the strong product stewardship approach to used lead acid batteries (ULABs) by allowing for the collection of small amounts of ULABs without the need for a licence or tracking.

Contaminated Land

- Updating guidance on the Duty to Manage and Duty to Notify
- Measuring background levels of naturally occurring substances
- Background levels of arsenic in the Goldfields region
- Notification system and process improvements

Guidance for business

Guidance is developed for:

Foundational state of knowledge

Examples:

- Assessing and controlling risk: A guide for business (16 languages)
- Self-assessment tool for small business (10 languages)
- Hazards and risk

Example:

- Liquid storage and handling guidelines
- Industry or sector guidance
